The International Prize in Japanese Studies was established by NIHU with cooperation from the Kuraray Foundation. The prize is awarded to researchers based outside of Japan who have made outstanding academic achievements in Japanese literature, language, history, folklore, society, environment, and other fields in the humanities, and who have made a significant contribution to the international development of Japanese studies. Kuraray executives also sit on the selection committee.
